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From the Pews, Jordan Smith

This is Your Day. The show led by televangelist Benny Hinn was a favorite of my grandmother and left an indelible impression on me as a child (along with more than a few soap operas too). And like many pre-school aged children, I spent quite a bit of time with my grandmother while my parents worked and was often at the mercy of her “programs.”

What made This is Your Day particularly mesmerizing to my young mind was the regular segment when Benny Hinn would “heal” members of the audience by touch, or even just with his words, and they would collapse into the waiting arms of his attendants. At first, I was dazed by the sheer mysticism of his apparent ability to discern their ailment and cast it out of their body with only his willpower and the name of Jesus Christ on his side. In time, my own faith and understanding of God grew and I became baffled by the masses of people in the crowd that actually believed Benny Hinn was “healing the sick” so dramatically and instantaneously.

And yet, at its heart, I believe Matthew 5:13-16 is also about healing as a verb, using the power of two very real phenomena as examples:

Salt – an abundant mineral that allows food to be preserved for safe consumption far longer that it can on its own; and

Light – an ethereal medium of illumination that makes sight possible, provides warmth, and casts out darkness.

We are the salt and we are the light. A beautifully simple and clear metaphor for the mysterious, divine presence of the Holy Spirit which God imparted to all humanity when the law had been fulfilled through Christ. You and I possess an ability to preserve the world around us and to give light to everyone we encounter; or, put another way, to heal. We don’t need to employ theatrical, daytime TV magic, but we do need to use our voices.

It almost sounds as sensational as a ‘90s televangelist – and I admit I am navigating a problematic reference point here in Benny Hinn – but our words do have power and our presence matters. Our ability to show kindness is powerful. Our ability to love others is powerful. Our ability to change God’s world comes in the moments we reach out, the moments we speak up, and the moments we share hope.

Even the smallest moments of our lives are powerful because our deepest humanity possesses and is changed by the infinite power of Christ in us... and it is compelling. And better still, unlike earthly things like salt and light, kindness and hope are not finite resources.

So, stay salty and be bright.







This text paraphrases Isaiah 11:6-9 in the first stanza, then reflects on that passage in widening frames of reference from self to all creation and identifies its "little child" with one born at Bethlehem. The tune is named for the composer's sister, his first piano teacher.
