HANDS-ONLY CPR CLASS

February is designated as Heart Month, focusing on heart health and cardiovascular disease prevention. What better way to celebrate this initiative than participating in a hands-only CPR class! According to the American Heart Association, about 90 percent of people who out-of-hospital cardiac arrests die. CPR, especially if performed immediately, can double or triple a cardiac arrest victim's chance of survival.

On Thursday, February 27, at 4:30p, a 45-minute class will be held at Westminster in Room 209 and is open to 15 participants (teenagers and adults only). The class will teach basic hands-only CPR (compressions), NOT certification for full CPR training. We also hope to have an AED demonstration and practice as well. From the Pews, Will Edwards

Have you ever been stressed, feeling the weight of the world on your shoulders, lost, broken... weak? I know I have. In that moment of weakness and vulnerability, did you have a sense of calmness, peace, a presence of strength that seemed to come from nowhere, only to realize it was God's grace?

In Paul's second letter to the Corinthians, he talked about a thorn in his flesh that tormented him. Paul appealed to the Lord to have the thorn removed, but God said to Paul, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness." Because of this Paul said he would boast more gladly of his weakness so that the power of Christ may dwell in him. Verse 10 in Chapter 12 sums this up, "Therefore I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities for the sake of Christ; for whenever I am weak, then I am strong."

A good friend of mine asked me if I ever heard the statement, God would never give you more than you can handle. I said I had. My friend said that is not quite right. God will give you more than you can handle because he wants us to rely on him. Pray. For His grace, mercy, and love will surround us.

There are many stories in the Bible where the central figure is in a state of weakness. When reading these stories, I have asked what more could this person endure. During my own struggles in weakness, I have looked up and said what more life could throw at me, how much more stuff could be piled on. How about you? Have you done the same thing? God is right there with us. His hands are on our shoulders. His arms embrace us. His grace surrounds us. It is hard to see while you are in the middle of it. But looking back, we were never alone. Our friends were there. That was God. A person you never met before offered a smile or held open a door. That was God. A friend whom you had not heard from in a long time suddenly reached out and asked how you were doing. That was God.

A couple of verses in Edwin McCain's song, Jesus, He Love Me are:

Times seem hopeless The night too dark to see The lone footprints on the road behind Were the times when You carried me

Now I've held the hands of the devil At the crossroads of my faith, yeah And my Lord He came and rescued me By His saving grace

In Christ, through the Holy Spirit, the grace of God strengthens us in weakness. It strengthens us every day.

Ruth

Ruth is a "historical novella" of a young Moabite woman living in the time of the judges, around 1100 BCE. While this is a story that inspires Jews as it is read each year in celebration of the Festival of Weeks, it is not a story that many of us know well. Inspiration though awaits all of us as we take time to study and reflect on this short book of 85 verses. Walter Brueggemann says that Ruth is "a woman who acts decisively to create a future for herself in a patriarchal social context where no good future was on offer for her." The idea of "creating a future where no good future is obvious" might just be worth considering during the difficult days in which we are currently living.

317 In Christ There Is No East or West



This setting expands and enhances the thematic inclusiveness of an early 20th-century text by adapting the melody of a traditional spiritual to carry these words. This 1940 pairing marked the first use of African American musical material in a mainline North American hymnal.
