**From the Pews, Amanda Warren**

The pastor of my childhood Presbyterian church once preached a sermon entitled "You Can Pray While Brushing Your Teeth, But You Shouldn't Brush Your Teeth While Praying." I was in middle school at the time, and I remember being exceptionally curious about what exactly my pastor was going to say that Sunday morning.

Many years have passed since then, but if my memory serves me correctly, the main point my pastor was trying to relay is that one can pray whenever and wherever they would like as long as the prayer being offered is genuine and not given in a distracted fashion. Fancy words and opulent spaces are not necessary, nor is a crowd of people to hear the prayer being made. What God cares most about is sincerity.

In today's passage from the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus speaks about prayer. He warns those listening not to offer up empty prayers that sound important but really are only meant for others' approval. He reminds his disciples that God knows what we need before we even ask, and intimate prayers are best. He then provides a prayer—what we now know as the Lord's Prayer—that his disciples can use as a model. Today's scripture verses focus on the first half of the prayer, which includes themes of a personal relationship with God, respect and reverence, requests for daily provisions, forgiveness for self that is then extended to others, and protection.

While we speak this prayer together weekly in worship—and perhaps at other times throughout each week—how many of us actually follow this model and incorporate these themes when praying on our own? I know that if God were giving me a grade for my prayer practices, I would not earn an A.

The good news is that prayer is not a graded assignment and that Jesus was very specific about the things I can and should change. No guessing or public presentations are required for any of us! And we don't have to worry about our attempts not being esteemed or good enough. God cares about our prayers being heartfelt, not perfect.

So, the next time you're brushing teeth and you feel a desire to truly connect with God on a personal level, I encourage you to give it a try. I promise to do the same.

Many people sing this hymn unaware that it paraphrases Psalm 90, partly because this text speaks so immediately to the human condition. Since the middle of the 19th century, it has usually been joined to this tune named for the London parish where the composer was organist.
