
# From the Pews, Mike Peters

I must admit that I am a very impatient person. I do not like to wait. Sitting through multiple traffic lights on Faris at Augusta can be painful. I don't like standing in line at the grocery store. Thank goodness for an available self-check spot. And please, let's not even bring up what goes on at the DMV. But waiting is a part of life and often the waiting and the anticipation of future events enhances the experiences both before and after when they occur. As the adage goes, "good things come to those who wait." For example, I imagine the confirmands have been waiting anxiously for this day when they officially become members of the church. And I can only imagine how our mothers waited excitedly and perhaps at times impatiently for our birth.

And waiting is exactly what Psalm 130, one of the so-called songs of ascent, asks us to do - wait, wait for the Lord. (The songs of ascent, Psalms 120-134 were thought to have been sung by Jewish pilgrims as they traveled up to Jerusalem for the great feasts.) Why must we wait? Because our only hope, considering the depth of our sins, is the presence and intervention of a loving and merciful God. A God, who while knowing our sins, forgives them. We cannot escape our sin on our own. We need God's power, love and mercy to redeem us from our sinfulness. Therefore, because of the certainty that God will hear our prayers and our hope and trust in his love, mercy and redemption, we wait expectantly and confidently, as the Psalm says, "as the watchman does the morning," for ADORATION



Franz Liszt used this melody for a "Crusaders' March" in an oratorio, but this hymn had nothing to do with the Crusades. No record of the German text exists before the middle of the 17th century or of the Silesian folk melody before the first half of the 19th century.



This hymn is a celebration of mutuality and diversity as well as a challenge to the Christian community to live out a ministry of reconciliation and inclusion. This 20th-century text is set to a 19th-century tune named for the noted pastor and preacher Henry Ward Beecher.

JUSTICE AND RECONCILIATION



Recognizing that this text arose from the years of apartheid in South Africa adds depth and resonance to its already confident language. Yet these words can also be read as a summary of Christ's death and resurrection, the true basis of our hope that good will triumph over evil.
