From the Pews, Jim Gettys

"Well...that just happened."

In our text for today we read of the moments when Jesus last appears to his Apostles whom he has asked to wait in Jerusalem for "the promise of the Father". Not suprisingly, they, seeing Him in His glory, immediately ask if this is the time for the restoration of Israel. Christ informs them that the "times or periods that the Father has set" are not for them to know but that they will not be left alone to wait. They will be given power and a task to perform until the redemption comes. The gift of power will be the Holy Spirit and the task is that of Witnessing to the authority and majesty of Jesus Christ. Following that, the Apostles are stunned to see Christ ascend into heaven in majesty. Leaving them I imagine, mouths agape, staring up at what they had just seen.

I know that I, and I expect all of us to one degree or another, can relate to an experience that so caught us off guard and reframed our perspective on the world that we were literally stopped in our tracks, standing dumbly while we tried to make sense of what we had just seen. We need look no further than the upheaval and disruption of the last 3 months to find an example, I'd bet. Although the experience of the Apostles and that of our own society have clear and obvious differences, some themes seem to run in parallel with one another.

Christ clearly tells the Apostles that only the Father has true authority over when things will begin and end in the lives of His people. The most powerful person in the world, apparently even Christ himself cannot, through will or desire, truly determine the course of history. As Presbyterians, we more than other denominations may accept this form of predestination with more ease than other traditions, but it still can be hard to swallow. One may look at this as making our experiences less meaningful and our efforts futile. One could drift into apathy, waiting for the Father to "fix it" in His time. During our own time of isolation, anxiety and illness and the need to wait on the natural course of the pandemic to pass, many of us are no doubt feeling abandoned and forgotten. Had not Christ followed this passage with one of inclusion and purpose the Apostles, like many of us, may have given up hope of a brighter future.

That purpose was to be for them, and can still be for us, that of witnessing to the power and love that is in Christ. Not only have we all been given a job to do while we wait on the Father, we are invested with the power to accomplish it. Christ is not leaving us to figure out how we will witness but has provided the Holy Spirit to empower, teach, comfort and guide us. Just as the Apostles were facing an uncertain and dangerous path, we are being asked to live in uncertainty and danger ourselves. Although we cannot change the future or determine when this plague will end, we can and should still call on the Holy Spirit to guide us toward how Christ would use us in this time to love, support and comfort one another. We have nothing but time on our hands, lets all use it with purpose to accomplish the work of Christ.
