Genesis 21: 8-21 recounts Hagar and Ishmael being sent out into the wilderness by Abraham. He gave them bread and a skin of water. The two wandered about until Hagar set her son under a bush and walked far enough away from him so she would not see him die. As a mother, as a grandmother, I shudder with grief and horror.

But the story did not end there. God, through his angel, gave Hagar a task. "Come, lift up the boy and hold him fast with your hand." It was then Hagar saw the well and water and gave Ishmael a drink. God's promise for Ishmael would be fulfilled.

We too, are in the wilderness, brought in sharp focus by an invisible virus.

So many people are so sick. So many loved ones are dying. So many families are in crises. This pandemic has laid bare tragic shortfalls in our national and local communities.

George Floyd was murdered. He was not the first. It cannot be denied. It is not that I did not know that these deep disparities exist in our society. I hold myself accountable. I humbly thank God for His grace.

Each one of us, no matter our status, our politics, our actions, our inactions, our secret thoughts, our spoken proclamations, our faith, wherever we are in this wilderness, somehow each of us is in need of God's grace.

Therein lies our hope. Christ is in our wilderness with each and every one of us, even with those I do not like. I think He gives us a task. I imagine He might say, "Come, lift up one another. The Holy Spirit is with you." Ordinary people, needing God's grace as they stand, not knowing exactly how or where they will end, step out.

It will be hard. In each of us, there is some part of this injustice that we must recognize as our own, that we must let go. We will at times, hold on tight to what is wrong, to our prejudices. Even the best of us will make mistakes, but our saving grace will be Christ. The Bible shows His great love, His perfect example and His everlasting promise- He is with us.

There are men, women, and even children who continue to follow Christ despite real dangers. Many, in our families, in our church, and around the world, already confront injustice. I suspect you may be one of them. More will follow. We will know some of their names and will remember their great deeds. Many, we will never know, but we will be blessed by their acts of great courage. None, not one, was perfect yet they stood when Christ called, and He did not forsake them.

This, I think, is what I know now and the task I see before me. God's grace will correct me along my path.
