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From the Pews, Parks Workman

Often, it's just easier to do things ourselves. If we do it, we know it will be done the right way. We can control the outcome. We can ensure it meets the highest quality standards. There will be no mistakes. No one else could possibly do the task as well—or as fast or as efficiently—as we can.

How often have you fallen prey to such arrogance? I know I struggle with it daily. It often seems easier to take matters into my own hands instead of taking a leap of faith to trust others. Unfortunately, this approach leads to isolation, missed opportunities, and stagnation. We can surely see how detrimental this is in our personal and work lives—but it is even more damaging in our spiritual lives.

I am amazed by the wisdom provided by the Spirit to the early church leaders. The disciples recognized that they couldn't do everything themselves and that if they tried, not all needs would be served. Rather than taking control, the disciples entrusted seven others to help advance the Kingdom so they could focus on their own spiritual gifts.

It is this approach that has allowed the church to blossom and grow. Indeed, Acts 6:7 hammers the point home: "So the word of God spread. The number of disciples in Jerusalem increased rapidly, and a large number of priests became obedient to the faith."

The church grew not through the arrogance or need for control of its leaders. Rather, the church grew through humility, recognizing limitations, and trusting others. As we reflect on our own tendencies toward self-reliance, perhaps we can see opportunities to move away from this safety net and lean more toward humility, trusting others, and trusting God.

I know there are many tasks laid out before us. The next time you are feeling overwhelmed, trust that God will find a path forward for you—and that path may involve relying on others for support. When we follow the example of Jesus and his disciples—walking in humility and trusting others—we strengthen our church, deepen our relationships, and grow in our faithfulness.
