ADULT EDUCATION OPPORTUNITIES

"If a person is in Christ, she is a new creation, the past is finished and done, behold the new has come" (II Cor. 5:17). Not only is the New Year upon us, but so is the possibility to live a new life in Jesus. Come worship, stretch, grow, be mentally and spiritually challenged, laugh, and share with other church members in worship services and adult Sunday School in 2018.

At Westminster, in adult Sunday School, we offer courses on the Bible, theology, social issues, and relationships in a rotation model. Class options change every 6-8 weeks so that members can learn about and discuss our Christian faith and all of its implications. With this model, people of all ages, genders, opinions, and interests are constantly rearranging and getting to know each other. Join us in this vibrant style of Christian adult education.

The following classes will be offered on Sundays, from 10-11:00 a.m., starting January 7 and ending February 25.

1. Being Mortal: Medicine and What Matters in the End

Medicine has triumphed in modern times, transforming the dangers of childbirth, injury, and disease from harrowing to manageable. But when it comes to the human realities of aging, frailty, and death, what medicine can do often runs counter to what it should do. As Christians, and creatures made by God, how do we protect meaning, purpose, and grace as we age and die, in the face of the temptation to keep medically treating our bodies. Using a book by Atul Gawande, MD, this class will wrestle with these hard questions.



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
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
