THE EYES OF DAVID
Psalm 34

I've often marveled at how someone who routinely makes selfish and reckless decisions can still see the world through God's eyes. Even more amazing to me is that God would continue to use someone like that over and over again. God waits on us and welcomes us back when our vision is restored and we see life through the lens of Christ's resurrection.

David wrote Psalm 34 at an interesting point in his life. Having fled Saul's wrath, David arrived in the Philistine city of Gath. Once there, the king recognized him and David was afraid for his life. David then pretended to be a madman to hide his true identity and he was sent away. Though his bizarre charade worked, David barely escaped and wound up hiding in a cave.

Other desperate men eventually joined David in his hideout. As they did, David continued his Psalm writing and it is believed he composed this Psalm while holed up in that cave. As wild and foolish as his actions were, David never lost sight of God's love and protection. David may even have sung this Psalm to his misfit brothers in that cave.

Psalm 34 is an alphabetic acrostic, as each verse begins with a successive letter of the Hebrew alphabet. This type of writing could have been done by only the most skilled writers. Also, this Psalm can be divided into two general sections. Verses 1-10 are words of praise sung to God (a Hymn). It is here that David exalts God for repeatedly saving him and pouring His love upon him. Verses 11-22 finds David instructing mankind to fear the Lord and to follow His instructions (a sermon). David seemed to always be cognizant of God's holiness and mercy. So much so that, even after moments of foolishness, David could quickly pivot back to his role of teacher for the generations.

The Biblical David was a man of contradictions. In one moment he could see the world and be tempted by all the sinful pleasures it possessed. A moment later he could inherit a vision of God's holiness and write the most beautiful praise songs ever to be sung.

Maybe you and I are like David in our own way. We see the beauty of sin all around us. It's appealing, for certain. But the same eyes that are sometimes tempted, can also see through beauty's facade. God loved the imperfect David and used him in the most wonderful ways.

The good news? God loves you just as much.
