MY FATHER'S HOUSE

Through good fortune, I grew up in a brick, ranch style house set in the middle of a hay field in Mississippi. Throughout my childhood and on into my adult life, that was my family's house.

But in a sense, as Jesus explained in Luke 2:49, my childhood also offered another house. My father's house wasn't a temple or place of worship, but the barns, gravel roads and fields of a third-generation dairy farm. This house had mud floors, viscous and ineradicable, with walls made of barbed wire that seemed to go

In my father's house I learned that hard work sometimes has no end and little immediate reward. Sometimes in that house nature was dispassionate and cruel. I learned that sometimes you will have to care for things that don't care back. Sometimes, when there was rain or snow or searing heat or other places you wanted to be, you had to go out anyway.

When it snowed earlier this month, I was reminded of what a snow day looked like for me on the farm. My father and I would walk the fences looking for downed trees or limbs that would give the cows easy passage to the grass so green on the other side. When such a downed tree or limb was found we would cut it into firewood. Usually the wood we were cutting was coated thick with ice.

We also visited the ponds. On our farm, we didn't rely strictly on water troughs. To get water the cows often waded out into ponds that were designed specifically for the purpose. On freezing cold days, they would want to do the same thing and were in danger of drowning if they were able to walk out too far on the ice. To prevent that my father and I would circle the pond, busting the ice with a splitting maul, often returning throughout the day to repeat the process.

Such is the way of the farmer.

It is also analogous to the way of Christian outreach and mission. Sometimes the work has no end and little immediate reward. Sometimes we find circumstances that are unfortunate and cruel. Sometimes we care for things or people that much of the world would just as soon ignore. Sometimes we do it, even when we don't want to. Through good fortune or purposeful selection, we attend a church that places Christian outreach and mission high on the priority list. This prioritization is evident when you browse the Westminster website, or review the church's budget or simply by scanning the calendar here in The Harbinger. In today's reading, as early Christians, the Colossians were instructed to clothe their new selves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness and patience. Now 2000 years on, as we turn to a new year, let us turn to these instructions of virtue. As we reach out into an unsettled world let us resolve to have compassion instead of indifference; kindness instead of insolence; humility instead of pride; meekness instead of gruffness; and when there is restlessness, may God grant us patience.
