on the topic of worry?"

I felt an Abrahamic chuckle emanating from within me upon looking up the selected passage from Luke this week: "God, you want me to share a few words

The past decade plus change has seen me plunge from the comparatively worry-free days of college life into an adulthood filled with worries and anxietyproducing moments. And, that is *before* adding two young children to the mix!

From this backdrop, I approached this passage from Luke 12 as one speaking of "worry" in a broad sense and from the mindset of what it says about how I personally should respond to worrisome thoughts. With the help of some great resources from our church library, I've discovered commentary from others that greatly changes how I approach this passage.

Coming as it does on the heels of the parable of the rich fool, the "worry" of our passage relates to that which accompanies a desire for future security. This is, as Sharon Ringe points out in her Westminster Bible Companion for Luke, a concern of the "well-to-do" whereas those less fortunate are mainly concerned with their immediate survival needs.

When I consider my own list of worries, I immediately realize that procuring food and other necessities of life is not anxiety-producing for me as it is for so many others. Now, when I read this passage, I am less inclined to think about worrisome thoughts related to accumulation of even greater levels of security, and more inclined to think about how I can respond to the fact that my need for basic necessities has already been met.

I love how Justo Gonzalez suggests we should respond:

"Since it is God's will that even the ravens be fed...to strive for the kingdom is among other things to make certain that all are fed and all are clothed. We are not to worry about securing such things, for they are important to God; but precisely because they are important to God we must oppose everything that precludes all from having them." (Belief: A Theological Commentary on the Bible)

Jesus compels us to channel our energy spent worrying into energy spent into building a kingdom where the basic needs of all are met without fear or worry. How will we respond to this challenge?
