After supper a couple of weeks ago, Susan, Hughes and I took the dog out for an evening walk. It had been one of those hot, humid summer days where you knew at some point things were going to boil over and a summer thunderstorm was going to appear. But because it was the three of us, which is rare these days, and because our fourteen-year-old cocker spaniel seemed particularly spry, we went for the long route. At some point the wind came up and the trees began to sway and turn inside out. We were too far from home to get home unscathed. We were at the point where it didn't matter if we turned back or pressed on. If the rains came, either direction was likely to result in our being drenched. It was an uncomfortable place to be.

On that walk, naturally, I was thinking about my family's safety and the rain and the trees and the lightning. But I also had been thinking about a sermon Ben had given a week earlier. The sermon was about blind spots, but it was the sermon's phrase 'spiritually uncomfortable' that I had in mind at that point. On our walk, we had put ourselves in a position where we were not in full control of our fate. We had turned over our fate to other forces. We had left our comfort zone. Maybe I am doing it wrong, but I don't think I leave my comfort zone nearly enough – spiritually, meteorologically, or otherwise.

I count among my friends someone who does push me out of my comfort zone - spiritually, socially, emotionally. She is a poet. To see her perform is to see the very same power that we witnessed on our evening walk. Not the power to sway the trees, but the power to change the hearts, minds and actions of those she encounters. She is a force of nature. As a poet, she is an artist and her medium is her words, but her subject matter is love and oppression and family and mourning and righteousness. And as a poet and an artist her job is to see and feel and shine it back to us so we can see and feel it too. When she says 'I wish you black sons' she shows me my blind spots and shows me what a real hunger and thirst for righteousness sound like. It's uncomfortable - spiritually, socially, emotionally. The verses in Isaiah 61 and the Beatitudes shine back at us too. Maybe I am doing it wrong, but when I read those verses it's uncomfortable. I don't see all the qualities and actions that I seem to strive for in my life. Maybe I am just doing what's comfortable and safe. Maybe I should strive to be spiritually uncomfortable. Maybe that's just a good start. Maybe there are also spots throughout my life that are too comfortable – socially, emotionally.

Maybe I don't get too far from home often enough.
