HARBINGER

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"The Mirror shows us nothing more or less than the deepest, most desperate desire of our hearts," says Dumbledore, to Harry Potter, as he gazes into his reflection of the Mirror of Erised.

In the Harry Potter Series, the "Mirror of Erised" (which is the word "Desire" spelled backwards) allows the viewer to see their heart's desire in their reflection. Viewers might see the glory of a career path not taken, they might see themselves dancing in piles of gold and jewels, or a healthy version of themselves, living a life of health and wellness. They would see a replica of themselves, in a life void of sickness, doctor's appointments, funeral arrangements, debt collector calls. The mirror reflects a false life void of pain. The best version of themselves would be reflected back to them. A version unmarred by sin, almost porcelain in its effect. The viewers are presented with versions of their life that is unattainable or desires that are unhealthy, deeply dangerous to the beholder. It is revealed that the mirror is hidden away from society because many people go insane and succumb to their addiction of seeing "what could have been."

Dumbledore says to Harry, "The happiest man on earth would be able to use the Mirror of Erised like a normal mirror, that is, he would look into it and see himself exactly as he is."

From a Christian lens, The Mirror of Erised is a vessel that holds the exact directions for self-destruction. Spiritual weaknesses are revealed when people are confronted with their desires. In Matthew 4:1-11, Jesus fights temptation after forty days of fasting. He is presented with all the kingdoms and glory in the world, and yet Jesus swats away these temptations with ease. What desires in Jesus's heart provided a "roadmap" to Satan to attempt to destroy his spirit. and how was Jesus able to overcome his own desires to serve God? Was he able to smash the imaginary mirror reflecting "what could have been" through fasting and through his purified faith?

Is it our moral responsibility to inventory our potential areas of weakness and to glance once, just once... into a fictional Mirror of Erised to see the pieces of ourselves prone to temptation? If you were to peer inside... what desires could be used to tempt you... and how could that be used to separate you from God?

WHAT IS A "KYRIE?"

As we worship together throughout the season of Lent this year, you will notice two small additions to our liturgy. After the corporate prayer of confession, we are including a brief time of silence, followed by the singing of the Kyrie. We are including these liturgical practices for a couple of reasons:

- Lent is a season of penitence and limitation. During the time of silence, everyone is invited to continue with individual prayers of confession, reflecting with God upon the ways that we have missed the mark in our personal lives of faith.
- The singing of the Kyrie is a way to draw us back together in this moment of penitence. "Kyrie" refers to the Greek phrase "Kyrie" eleison," which means "Lord, have mercy." It is common in many Presbyterian churches to include a Kyrie every Sunday in worship. While we have not done so at Westminster, we do want to include it during this Lenten season to help draw attention to the meaning of Lent.

Of course, the emphasis on repentance during Lent does not negate the good news that we are forgiven and given new life in Jesus Christ. We hope that these two additions to our liturgy will make the journey from Lent to Easter more meaningful for you this year.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMMUNION TODAY

If you are seated in the main section of pews, you will proceed up the center aisle to receive communion. Please wait for an usher to prompt your row. Please take communion from one of the two serving stations at the front of the chancel located on the same side as your pew, and return to your pew via the side aisle.

When you come to a serving station, take a piece of bread from the plate, dip the bread in the cup, and eat. All cups contain grape juice.

If you are seated in the transept pews at either side of the sanctuary, you will take communion from the servers at the front of the transept. The section of pews closest to the chancel will go first. Please wait to be prompted by the usher. When prompted, please proceed up the center aisle of the transept, take communion at the front of the transept, and walk down the center aisle to the back of the transept, returning to your pew via the side transept aisle closest to your pew.

Please remain quiet during communion so that those who wish to pray may do so.

If you would like to receive communion but are unable to come forward, or if you would simply prefer to remain seated, there are two pairs of rovers to provide you with communion, one on each side aisle. When the rovers approach your pew, simply raise your hand to indicate that you would like to receive communion in your seat.

The bread we are offering at today's communion is labeled by the manufacturer as gluten, nut, egg, and dairy free, and includes the following ingredients: water, sourdough (rice flour, water), rice starch, corn starch, agave syrup, psylium seed husks (vegetable fiber), sunflower oil, modified cellulose, soy protein, yeast, millet flour, citrus fiber, rice flour, sugar, quinoa flour, salt, corn flour, honey, guar gum, calcium citrate, niacin, iron, thiamin, riboflavin. Contains soy.
