From the Pews, Corey Sanders

"Corey, we need a timeout!" These aren't the words you want to hear from your assistant coach in the championship game of church league basketball...

One of the lessons I learned last year was church basketball is far more competitive than it should be. As a former athlete, I can attest church basketball creates a rare breed of competitiveness. This probably explains why I loved coaching it a little too much! When a group of 9th grade boys asked me and David Hanor to coach the WPC team, little did we know we would need nothing short of a miracle to get our team into the championship.

After watching our first practice, it was evident we lacked some of the fundamentals of winning basketball. We were undersized, not great ball handlers, and getting the ball through the hoop was a bit of challenge. What we didn't lack were numbers and hustle. So what did we do? We asked our team to believe in our strategy, and if they did, we could be competitive.

Not many teams full court press and run trap defenses for entire basketball games. It's exhausting. However, when you have 15 players, you find strength in numbers. We deployed "hockey lines" and ran a new team of five every few minutes. We created chaos. We forced turnovers. We made layups... and we won a lot of games.

Yet, halfway through the championship we needed a timeout. Our guys were tested by a team that was older, bigger, faster and it was clear we were confused and on the precipice of defeat. David and I were frustrated.

In our scripture from Mark, we find the disciples in a similar position. They are confused after Jesus is tested by the Pharisees and then are warned by Jesus about the corruptness of the Pharisees and Herod. Instead of listening and remembering who Jesus is, they worry about not having enough bread (Jesus had just performed the miracle that fed 5,000 people with 5 loaves). Jesus calls the disciples out for their clouded judgement and their failure to remember. In Isaiah's passage, we find a hymn of praise calling us to remember and celebrate who God is. A call to remember, to trust, and rejoice in the comfort of God's grace and salvation.

Though not quite like Jesus in the boat with his disciples, I asked our players to do something similar during that timeout. I told them to stop focusing on the score, on being outmatched, on poor officiating. Instead I asked them to remember who we were and how we got there. All of the times we were underdogs and found ways to win. Needless to say, the trophy felt good hoisted in the air after the buzzer sounded. The Thunder Dolphins were "D-League" champions with a story likened to that of Rudy, Miracle on Ice, Remember the Titans. Or at least we like to remember it that way!

Whether it is overly competitive, "D" division church basketball leagues or Jesus speaking to his disciples, I think the message is clear. We don't always need a sign to understand and remember who we are...especially in our faith. Jesus simply asks us to remember and trust in him and his goodness. Look for those reminders and I assure you God's love and grace will be found. Rejoice and be glad in it.
