PRAY FOR OUR MISSION PARTNERS IN THE CARIBBEAN

In the past days communities in the Dominican Republic and Cuba have been devastated by Hurricane Laura. The Dominican Republic, a country with whom we have had a long shared history, was hit particularly hard. On Thursday, August 27, Witness and Service voted to send funds to Foundation for Peace, an on-the-ground relief and medical organization, to aid in relief efforts. Westminster's contribution, made possible by your faithful pledges, will ensure that Dominicans in Barahona, Port au Plata, and Santo Domingo receive the food, shelter, care, and provisions they need in the days following the storm. Witness & Service also allocated funds for relief through Presbyterian Disaster Assistance for relief in Cuba and the Caribbean. We hope that you will continue to hold the people of the Caribbean and the Gulf Coast of the United States in your prayers, particularly the mission partners and communities with whom we have worked in the past.

CAROLINA CLOSET FOOD & GOODS DRIVE

Carolina High School, located just off of White Horse Road, has a diverse student population, many of whom live under the poverty line. As our backyard neighbors, we are proud to have partnered with them for Hands on Greenville Day in 2018 and 2019 and for the 2017-2018 Carolina Westminster Connection. COVID-19 has brought profound challenges to the many families who rely on Carolina for food and basic necessities, and as students head back members of the CHS community find themselves in particular need.

The "Carolina Closet," run by teachers and students, provides clothing, supplies, and non-perishable food to any student in need. After a spring of heavy use, Carolina's supplies are critically low. The most popular food items are macaroni and cheese, small boxes of cereal, grits, oatmeal, hamburger helper, ravioli, fruit cups, pudding cups, crackers, cookies, canned vegetables, ramen noodles, canned chicken, and canned tuna.

From the Pews, Phil Gehman:

This week's Scripture passages focus on God's faithfulness in the midst of the storms of life. Both stories have their counterintuitive aspects. That is to say, they contain unanticipated surprises.

In the Old Testament story, Naomi, her husband, Elimelech, and their sons are in a foreign country, Moab, seeking relief from the famine in their homeland of Judah. Their sons marry Moabite women, Orpah and Ruth. A perfect storm strikes Naomi: first her husband dies, and then, over a period of years, her sons also die. Totally bereft of all that gives her life meaning, she decides to return home to Bethlehem. Her daughters-in-law wish to accompany her. She encourages them to remain in their home country; she has nothing to offer the new widows. But surprise, surprise: Ruth insists on going back to Judah with Naomi.

The New Testament story contains its own surprise. From the beginning, Jesus calls the disciples to follow him and usually wants them to stick close by. But this time, Jesus instructs them to leave him on shore and to cross the Sea of Galilee on their own. But difficulties arise as a result of their willingness to comply with his instructions. They encounter a ferocious storm. Worst of all, Jesus isn't there to rescue them.

This story stands in sharp contrast with an idea abroad in certain circles of contemporary Christian practice. There is among us a certain sentimental, transactional understanding of discipleship: Be good to God and God will in turn be good to you. Stay close to God and God is certain to protect you from harm, make you prosperous, and guarantee smooth sailing. It almost seems that Christians can control God's response to them and their place in the world by their willingness to "stay close."

But both stories remind us of the painful truth that discipleship is no insurance policy against the storms of danger, fear, and death. Yet they also remind us that God has the last word. Who could have guessed that Ruth, this widow from another country, would be blessed to be an ancestor of Jesus? And who could have guessed that the disciples, if they had been unwilling to embark in the boat, would have missed an opportunity to see Jesus revealed in a new, more glorious light?

And so we, too, are called to go forward in the midst of the storms of life, confident that we do not have the last word. We can abound in hope even in the worst of times. We can dare to become engaged in "good trouble," joining Jesus among the oppressed, the disadvantaged, the condemned, and the despairing, proclaiming by word and deed his Good News to all.

"Take heart, it is I; have no fear."
