### From the Pews, Corey Sanders

There were two musical highlights of the Christmas Eve service at the church I grew up in. First, was the choir director's rendition of "Mary Did You Know". Second, was the soprano belting the high note in "O Holy Night." These were constants every year, and honestly the Christmas season did not feel right without them.

Over time, "Oh Holy Night" has become one of my favorite Christmas hymns. There is a sense of nostalgia as I remember my childhood. The music is one of the most masterful compositions ever written in the Christmas genre. While those two reasons typically bring me goosebumps when its sung, as of late it is the lyrics and its history that have captured me even more.

The hymn's origin comes from medieval southern France. It was written by a merchant and poet to commemorate a local parish's newly renovated organ. The poem was then passed to a renowned composer and that is where it was born. In the mid-1800s it was translated to English and we have been singing it ever since.

As we have now closed the Christmas Advent season, I am still drawn to the words of this hymn. "Long lay the world in sin and error, pining. Till he appeared, and the soul felt his worth. A thrill of hope, the weary world rejoices."

I can't help but believe we aren't so different than those who were anxiously awaiting the birth of the savior. Just as the world was pining for (or better defined as "longing for the return of") Jesus' arrival, we too are living in a world pining for the days where masks are designated for surgeons and Halloween parties, where every pew can be full on Sunday mornings, and where family gatherings have no limitations.

As we try our best to refocus and recharge heading to the new year, I am reminded of the covenant made between God and His people. Today's Old Testament passage reminds us we are part of a promise made many years ago. A covenant that brings us blessings, righteousness, and salvation. Isaiah's soul is rejoicing in this promise.

It's fair to say we are living in a weary world. One whose problems seem to be growing by the day. My hope is that you are reminded of the words of "Oh Holy Night". I hope you remember God appeared in flesh and that the soul felt his worth. And more than ever, I hope this weary world will rejoice in the blessings of God's covenant to each of us.
