The Season of Lent

During the season of Lent, our sermon series will focus on the Psalms. The Psalms provide a rich resource for our worship, not only because of their breadth and variety, but also because of how they may be used.

For example, the early church sang the Psalms (Ephesians 5:19), so we will do so in our recorded worship this season. Instead of hearing me read a particular Psalm as the text prior to the sermon, the Psalm for the day might be sung in one of a variety of styles, from traditional chants and refrains to solos or choral settings.

Part of the power of the Psalms is that they give voice to so many different emotions and responses within our lives of faith. As biblical scholar Bernhard Anderson writes, "we find people addressing God in various ways [in the Psalms] - complaint in situations of distress and perplexity, thanksgiving in moods of liberation and joy, and hymnic praise in times of rejoicing in the goodness and wonder of God's creation and providential care."

Our sermon series will address themes or threads that are common throughout the Psalms. While by no means an exhaustive list, these themes include being known by God, the faithfulness of God, life, grief, enemies, and how a particular Psalm is used in the New Testament.

I hope you will take the time to read the Psalms during the season of Lent. It is a good spiritual discipline, and one that will provide connection to our worship this season.
