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From the Pews, Scott Clark

A few years back, in *The New Yorker* I encountered an excerpt from a book of photographs titled "The Pillar" by photographer Stephen Gill. The excerpt in the magazine included photographs as well as an essay which accompanies the book written by acclaimed Norwegian writer Karl Ove Knausgaard. [Reader – Please know that the previous two sentences are in no way a fair portrayal of how the Clarks consume media or spend their time and likely represent the most pretentious reference I believe I can make.] The photographs themselves are stunning, showing birds in motion and existence in ways I had never seen. However, it was a piece from the essay that has been in my head through the years –

"He [Gill] told me about a pair of wood pigeons that were nesting in a tree on the property. They'd first appeared four years before, building their nest, laying eggs, hatching them, and feeding their young—and just before the young reached the fledgling age a goshawk had come and taken them. But, the following spring, the pair returned to lay new eggs, feed new young—only for the goshawk to come and take them again, just days before they were ready to fly. Strangely, this didn't stop the pair from returning, again and again, to the very same place, with the very same result.

The story is a gruesome one. The wood pigeons did not only lose all their young that first spring; they exposed themselves to the same danger again, not just once but three times over, in each case with open eyes. They could do this only because they lack any conception of past or future, living their lives wholly and fully in the now, and in the now there is no goshawk. In the now is the nest, the eggs, the sun, the leaves of the tree, the warm air, the sounds drifting up from below, hunger, thirst, the overwhelming instinct that compels them to feed their screeching young. From the viewpoint of the wood pigeons, their life is no tragedy. They are, on the contrary, joyful: listen to how they coo, see how busily they seek food for their hungry chicks."

There are times in our lives when burdens threaten to overwhelm us, and we walk through periods of pain for so long that we become numb to its presence. Numbness slides into sorrow, which gives way to a sadness that turns into bleakness, and life loses its luster, and then, we despair. We despair and we fear.

Perhaps you have been in that place where hope seemed like a mirage. Where happiness seemed so distant that you feared you would never feel it again. Or a place where loneliness or depression descended upon you like a cloud. Most of us will relate to this experience at some point in our lives.

Sadly, unlike the wood pigeons we have a conception of past and future and for us, seasons of despair can seem endless and unrelenting. In such times, as Psalm 42 illustrates, we must fight for hope, know that we are loved, remember the joys of the past and count on the promise of tomorrow.
