From the Pews, Russ Williams

Today's scripture, Isaiah 6:1-13 is often referred to as "Isaiah's Call and Commission" and is one of the most important of the prophetic call passages in the Bible. To begin the passage, Isaiah (who lived in Jerusalem at the end of the 8th and beginning of the 9th centuries BCE) refers to the death of King Uzziah. This king was the only ruler that Isaiah had known during his life and is described as an effective leader who led Israel over a 52-year span. King Uzziah's death came at a critical time given the increasing threat of Assyrian invasion and the reported weakness of his son and successor, Jotham. Isaiah may be feeling anxiety and a sense of foreboding with the death of this long serving leader. He is clearly distressed with the uncertainty of the times and the potential loss of stability in his country. What will happen to the nation? Will it face economic ruin, and will its people return to idolatry as before? Will the people be forced to answer to an outside power?

With these real and significant concerns, Isaiah enters the Temple and envisions Yahweh sitting on a heavenly throne. His robes are "filling the Temple" and his glory fills the whole earth. The chamber of the Temple is described as ringing with the cries of "Holy, Holy," a phrase that all of us hear frequently in our worship and singing here at WPC. Isaiah seems to make a discovery that while the earthly king Uzziah has died, the true King, the one who transcends the human world and is the absolute God, is very much in power. Isaiah immediately realizes he is a sinner with "unclean lips," part of a nation of sinners with "unclean lips," in the presence of the holy God. Isaiah's unclean lips are then cleansed with the intercession of an other-worldly seraphim who places a coal from the Temple altar on his lips and thus removes his "iniquity." The prophet then volunteers as God's messenger in response to God's question of "Whom shall I send?" Isaiah is shocked to learn that in serving as the messenger, he will likely be estranged from his own world. Even more shocking, the scripture shares that the land and the people will be destroyed by their enemies. At the close of the passage, we learn

that despite the pending destruction and loss, God will ultimately allow Israel a new beginning that will sprout from the "remnants."

How does this passage apply to us? We have all experienced a great deal of uncertainty and anxiety in recent times. The pandemic, political turmoil, difficulty and conflict in many parts of our world; all make it easy to relate to the feelings that Isaiah experienced with the death of the good King Uzziah. Like Isaiah, I have spent a good bit of time during the last 18 months, longing for the "good old days" and worrying with the uncertainty of the world situation. In fact, I will admit to seeking solace in the nostalgic simplicity of life as portrayed in *The Andy Griffith Show* during this pandemic. For any who are interested, with appropriate scheduling, one can catch up to a few hours of *The Andy Griffith Show* daily. Rather than seeking comfort and wasting time with an unhealthy level of focus on an unrealistic and idyllic past, perhaps, like Isaiah, I should realize that God is still the present and absolute ruler. He is the holy God who is always moving in this world. Perhaps, in seeking the Lord's presence, we can lessen our worldly anxiety and move in a positive and forward direction in our lives?

The other thought that comes to me from this passage relates to the challenge to the Prophet Isaiah in being God's messenger. He seems to realize that in being in God's presence and in accepting the call to be his messenger, he may face hardship and estrangement. It is exciting to think that we, like Isaiah, might seek God's presence and see ourselves as we truly are, sinners in need of the cleansing "coal." And perhaps then, we will be able to more clearly see God's will for us, our life's role and commission? Amen.
