From the Pews, George McLarty

Our scripture reading this week is Mark's reflection on an encounter between the Pharisees and Jesus. The exchange starts when the Pharisees and some scribes notice many of the disciples eating without first washing their hands. The Pharisees proceed to ask Jesus, "Why do your disciples not live according to the tradition of the elders, but eat with defiled hands?" But why do the Pharisees take such strong offense?

The Pharisees are known for their strong intention to obey God's law. Their passion to enforce Biblical commandments resulted in the establishment of a set of rules intended to ensure they lived in accordance with the written word. This oral interpretation became known as "the tradition of the elders" and was the accepted proper behavior of the Pharisees. Their oral laws were very specific and direct. In this case, the tradition of the elders requires that everyone wash their hands before eating as a step to ensure ritual purity. The Pharisees were likely shocked by the disciples' choice to not adhere to the oral law, by washing their hands before eating. Today, we simply think of washing hands before a meal as good hygiene but likely not ritual purity.

Jesus did not appreciate the Pharisees calling out the disciples, and he defends the disciples in his response. He knows the disciples well, sees their actions, and undoubtedly knows that they are followers of God's word. Jesus also seems to disagree with some of the oral interpretations and feels these traditions are inferior to the written word.

This passage makes us think about the societal norms and traditions of today; they are all around us. No matter their origin, societal norms impact our families and social networks. Many of today's traditions do not have a Biblical origin. Even more, these norms are often influenced by our culture and social media. If we do something out of tradition, is it for the right reasons? Are we challenging these traditions or simply following others? Do we place judgment on others for not following certain traditions we find important?

The pandemic has forced all families to deviate from many of our traditions. We altered our celebration of birthdays, graduations, vacation travel, holiday gatherings, anniversaries, weddings, baptisms, worship, and more. Did you struggle with having some of these norms taken away? Or are you okay with leaving some of those previous norms behind?

As we reflect on our passage, we should continue to challenge our own traditions and frequently reevaluate why these traditions remain important in today's world. May we learn from the Pharisees' actions and resist the urge to judge traditions that contrast our own.
