From the Pews, Neil Shurley

Now the LORD said to Abram, "Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you. I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you, and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you, and the one who curses you I will curse; and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed." So Abram went, as the LORD had told him; and Lot went with him. Abram was seventy-five years old when he departed from Haran.

It's been 75 years since twenty-three members of First Presbyterian Church first answered a call to venture forth from downtown Greenville and establish a new church at the very edges of the wilderness – Augusta Rd.

In those 75 years, Westminster Presbyterian Church grew from an idea to a tent to a small building known as "The Basement" to the stunning campus that now anchors the Augusta Rd. corridor.

In those 75 years, the people of Westminster have worshipped with six senior pastors, shepherded Meals on Wheels into existence, educated thousands of children through the Weekday School and the It's Elementary program, welcomed numerous challenging and thoughtful Heritage Lecturers, and led mission projects that have transformed lives in our own neighborhoods and across the world. Could those 23 dreamers possibly have seen where Westminster would be 75 years in their future?

That's how old Abram was when God called him to venture forth into the wilderness, to set forth into the unknown, "to the land that I will show you."

What had Abram experienced in his 75 years of life? Married but childless, Abram lived comfortably with his extended family in the land of Haran. Genesis tells us he was very rich in livestock, silver, and gold. Surely, now that he was a wealthy 75 year old man, Abram sensed that his life was reaching its conclusion.

But then God called him, and told him to leave the country he knew, the family he knew, to travel hundreds of miles to an unfamiliar land where he would pitch a tent and build an altar to the Lord. Yet that was only the beginning. In the years to come, Abram would almost lose his wife to an Egyptian Pharoah, bargain with God about showing compassion to the inhabitants of Sodom and Gomorrah, launch a successful rescue of his nephew Lot, and demonstrate hospitality to strangers - angels - who visited him in the heat of day. But that was not all, for God made a promise to Abram, that he would become the father of a multitude of nations, and so God renamed him Abraham. And at an age so ludicrously old that it made his wife laugh, Abraham became a father. And even then his adventures had only just begun.

Westminster Presbyterian Church is now 75 years old. Surely it's time to rest on our laurels, to ease into our own comfortable existence. After all, we welcome strangers, we sustain mission partners. Our membership continues to grow, our programs continue to thrive. Surely we are doing things right. Surely there are no new adventures awaiting us. After all, it's been 75 years since God's "still, small voice" spoke to 23 people in downtown Greenville.

Wait – did I just hear a still, small voice? What could God be calling us to do next?

At the end of 1986 net membership stood at 1,057 – slightly ahead of the prior year by 11 members. In December 1986, the Pastor Nominating Committee put forth the name of The Reverend Ludwig Lee Weaver, Jr. to serve as Westminster's fifth Senior Pastor. Lud accepted the call and began work in February 1987. I served on Lud's first Session and quickly came to admire his vision for Westminster. No longer a young somewhat small neighborhood church, Westminster came of age as it drew large numbers of new members from all areas of the county.

In July 1987 Susie accepted a call to become Chaplain at Converse College. Before leaving WPC, she led a mission trip to Haiti. Surely Susie's challenging of Westminster members to open their hearts to the human condition made a lasting impression on the church.

One of the highlights of 1986 was the passage of a motion to lead the congregation in a peace making endeavor based on Martin Luther King's "Living the Dream Pledge".

John Haley and Susie Smith didn't miss a beat in leading the congregation during this interim period in the life of the church.
