From the Pews, Rance Bryan

Playing sports was a big part of my childhood. Football, basketball, and baseball were my favorites, and I was fortunate to be able to play them all through middle and high school. Regularly we would finish a season of one sport on a Friday and start the next sport the following Monday. I attended a small, Christian school in Edgefield, SC and it was a common occurrence for us to travel several hours to play another team that had an enrollment similar to ours. Many of these schools were also Christian based, and frequently, Philippians 4:13 would be prominently displayed inside the gym or locker rooms.

“I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me” was a familiar slogan and was even printed on some of the team related t-shirts we had. The misconception that I, and most of my teammates, had with this verse was that God was going to give us the strength to defeat our opponents. That prayer, instead of practice, could lead to victories. I can now see that Paul did not have state championships in mind when he was writing his letter to the Philippians.

Reading the entire passage provides the context for Verse 13. Philippians 4:4-7 reminds us to put our faith in the Lord and he will guard our hearts and minds. This is the strength that Paul wanted everyone to understand and receive. Verse 12 continues with “I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, living in plenty or in want.” Paul is discussing the challenges he has faced in his life and in his ministry. But his faith in God provided the necessary strength to lead him through difficult circumstances. Remember, Paul wrote these letters while in prison.

My simple interpretation of Philippians 4:13 was sufficient for me in middle and high school. I felt, and knew, that God was watching over us while we played; but I mistakenly thought he was a little more involved in the outcome than he actually was. As I now have a deeper understanding of this passage, it is much more comforting to know that God wants to provide us a greater strength than could ever be displayed on an athletic field, but that it is up to us to create the relationship that will allow that to happen.

From 1947-2007, Westminster had grown from a group of 23 people who were encouraged by First Presbyterian Church to give birth to a new church in the “developing Augusta Road area.” By 2007 total active membership stood at 1,463. New fellowship groups were emerging to encourage members of our much larger church to involve themselves in smaller, more intimate gatherings. Two new groups in 2007 were Connections and the Centering Prayer Group, an outgrowth of the 2006 November Nights class taught by Associate Pastor Dave Carlson. February 2007 brought the Lenten and Mission Festival, which featured an international theme and brought attention to 14 missions in which WPC was involved. Mission work in Asia, Africa and The Dominican Republic were highlighted with individual stations, where WPC members explained and demonstrated their different work.

With continued growth in new members every month, Susan McLarty, our Volunteer Coordinator, helped assimilate these members into the mission life of the church. The New Member Assimilation Committee assisted in finding where newcomers could put their gifts and talents to good work. Barbara Stoop was honored by the DAR with a Community Service Award based on her many years of work with the Girl Scouts at the Pleasant Valley Connection. The summer of 2007 saw 15 Westminster youth attend the Montreat Youth Conference, accompanied by Elder Donn James and several other adults. The keynote speaker was the Reverend Scott Phillips, brother of WPC Associate Pastor, Steve Phillips.

After many capital campaigns, 2008 was the beginning of discussions to enlarge the sanctuary. Out of these discussions came “A Place for Everyone,” the campaign to raise \$6M to finish the plans that grew out of Freeman & Major’s 25 Year Plan. In addition to making badly needed renovations to the existing building, the sanctuary was enlarged from seating for 368 to 676. The administrative wing would be completely renovated as well and would enclose the area formerly occupied by the Jenny Lee Easley Lounge and meditation garden into the Atrium we now enjoy. The formal dedication of the new sanctuary was held on August 30, 2009, when Lud Weaver preached a sermon entitled “I belong to...” Former Pastor Zane Moore was also on hand to participate in worship. The amazing, renovated and enlarged sanctuary was completed down to the last brick to resemble the former building’s interior. By late 2009 the church’s 25-year building plan had been accomplished. The carefully documented history of Westminster came to a close around this time with the publishing of Sue Inman’s wonderful book, *Growing in Faith – A History of Westminster Presbyterian Church (2007)*.

With continuing growth in technology, Live Stream Worship was begun in 2009. Christ Care groups emerged and became active; Westminster held its 20th Service of Memory and Celebration, honoring those members who had passed away during the year. In 2010 WPC became a member of GAIHN (Greenville Area Interfaith Hospitality Network – now known as IHN and part of United Ministries). This mission work involved individual churches physically hosting families dealing with homelessness; families lived and were provided meals at a host church for a week at a time and then moved to another host church.

Westminster had long been a church that offered such a varied program of activities for its members and families. By 2013 the church was sponsoring 30 different basketball teams competing against many other churches. Over the years, many adults headed this mammoth undertaking, including Forrest Harrison “Whitey” Kendall, Tommy Miller, Tim Raney, and Charles “Bubba” Puntch.

On September 29, 2013, Leigh Stuckey, a graduate of Presbyterian College and Princeton Theological Seminary, was ordained as Westminster’s Associate Pastor for Young Adults, Mission & Social Media. Leigh quickly became a strong and gifted teacher and preacher who brought the word to the congregation, both from the lectern and the pulpit.

WPC was fortunate to host the Moderator of the General Assembly (Rev. Dr. Heath Rada) around this time. Westminster Weekday School, opened in 1966, was expanded and now serving hundreds of children from WPC and the community at large. Always local mission minded, WPC donated \$100K to The City of Greenville Housing Authority to facilitate a trust fund for affordable housing.

On May 28, 2017, Clemson University and Columbia Theological Seminary graduate, Mary Kathleen Duncan, was installed as Associate Pastor for Youth & Their Families. She told me recently that her call to ministry occurred when she was 12 and never waned. That same year, Westminster built another Habitat for Humanity house, one of several in recent years.

In 2018, long time Senior Pastor and Head of Staff, Lud Weaver, retired along with his wife, Jean, our Parish Associate. The Weavers had informed the Session of their plans to retire well in advance of this date; this facilitated a seamless transition in leadership. Barb Stoop, long-time Associate Pastor for Children, retired in the summer of 2019.

After a diligent and thorough search, on February 10, 2019, Ben Dorr was installed as our sixth Senior Pastor and Head of Staff. Ben, his wife Heather, and sons Cooper and Sam, quickly assimilated into the Westminster family. Ben’s preaching and gentle nature has served WPC so well in the 4 years he has led our congregation. Ben came to WPC from Northridge Presbyterian Church in Dallas; he’s a graduate of Carleton College and Princeton Theological Seminary.

On February 2, 2020, Lauren Slingerland was ordained and installed as Associate Pastor for Children & Their Families. A graduate of Furman University and Columbia Theological Seminary, and a former educator, Lauren is the “host” of It’s Elementary and Vacation Bible School, among other jobs. Her elementary education background and loving personality are serving us well. It’s Elementary is in its 26th year.

Rounding out our Pastoral Staff, Julia Watkins was installed as Associate Pastor for Mission & Congregational Life on October 17, 2021. Julia graduated from Davidson College and Princeton Theological Seminary; as with all of our Pastors, her sermons are meaningful, relevant, and inspiring.

The Giants of Westminster

Throughout its 75 year history, like any other family of faith, the majority of jobs and responsibilities at Westminster have been undertaken by volunteers. As I close out this final piece on WPC’s history, I would be remiss not to include what I will refer to as “The Giants of Westminster.” This is a group of people whose names should be given to new members – never to be forgotten. They are the people no longer among us, who built our church, day in and day out, brick by brick, by repeatedly being at the front of the line to do the jobs and take on the responsibilities necessary for Westminster to thrive. These individuals served God’s people both within our doors as well as out in the community and around the world. Some were among the 23 original pioneers who left First Presbyterian Church in 1947; others were charter members later in the 1940’s. All were ordained by God to serve as Elders or Deacons for more than one term. Many also

as Trustees as well. All gave sacrificially of their time, talents and resources and never said “No – not this year.” These incredibly dedicated men and women, with their families, were at the church every time the doors were open. The scriptures, values and moral teachings at WPC were a code they lived by and is what they taught their children. They were sinners in need of God’s grace, but the way they lived their lives was a testament of thanksgiving for His grace. They were chairs/members of the many building/capital campaigns to enlarge and improve our physical plant. They were Sunday School teachers, Superintendents, Youth leaders, and basketball coaches. They were the ones who went to the bank on some Mondays when meeting the church’s payroll was in doubt. They were chairs/members of the many pastoral search committees who brought us so many gifted pastors. They served the Denomination as members/chairs of Presbytery Council, the Synod of the South and as Commissioners of the General Assembly. These giants stayed when hundreds were leaving, and courageously worked to bring people together. They were the genesis for many local missions on whose boards they served and supported. They were loving, supportive friends of their pastors – even after they moved on in their careers. They were the ones who were vocal about the need for benevolences and mission mindedness. They encouraged us to take risks when the result could serve God’s people better. They stood in front of the church office to greet everyone who walked by as an informal greeter for decades. They said we need to dream again. Everyone in WPC’s family of faith volunteers from time to time. While we cannot name all who have contributed their love and sacrifice, these are some who did every job in the church repeatedly and never said no. May God’s people know about and always remember their names and try to emulate their unwavering dedication to Westminster:
