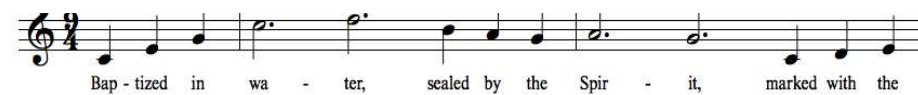

From the Pews, Rob Warren

“God is our refuge and strength.” – Psalm 46

When informed of this week's scripture, I got the distinct sense that I'd heard it before. A comforting reminder for certain, but one that often feels like it is played on repeat.

Although I may be a long way from becoming a biblical scholar, I am never that far from Google, and a quick search informed me that the word “refuge” is used 88 times in the Bible. Mostly in the Old Testament. Frequently in Psalms.

We've all had to repeat ourselves, but 88 times? That seems excessive. But then I wondered:

If the message is important, then why should it change?

Flash back to a recently-married Amanda and me as we looked for a church home and visited Westminster. At that time, the church was in a campaign to renovate and expand its weekday school, Sunday School and youth facilities, and gymnasium. I sat in the pew and considered the fact that Westminster was investing so much in people who were very young or had not even been born yet.

Additional Sundays at Westminster taught us about the church's focus on mission, outreach, and service resulting in a considerable portion of the annual budget being dedicated to those endeavors. First in Greenville and our own community, and then in farther-flung corners like the Dominican Republic, Cuba, and Malawi.

The message was clear: help others and build up the Westminster community.

Since that first Sunday, Amanda and I have had the privilege to serve Westminster in various capacities. We have participated in some of that outreach and engaged in some of that mission work. We started our family, and suddenly, our children were reaping the benefits of the investment that this congregation made in its young people. Now Zach and Cam are old enough that all four of us can share in more of those experiences.

Come back to the present, and Westminster continues to grow. New member classes overrun the front of the sanctuary. No less than 1,400 baptisms occur on an annual basis! Hundreds of students participate in It's Elementary and the Middlers and Senior High youth programs. Each year, the impact that Westminster makes through missions and outreach shows the generosity of this congregation.

We help others and build up the Westminster community.

Flash forward to a time when our pews have even more new faces. Maybe they belong to new members. Maybe they belong to others who are just visiting, searching for their own church home. I'm grateful for a Westminster that will still prioritize the growth and development of its congregation, while making an impact through its service to others.
