

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**From the Pews, Katherine Gettys**

I recently lost my father. He was an amazing dad, he taught me about Jesus, prayed with me, and raised me in faith. My recent loss has me seeing our scripture today in a new way. In Matthew 4:18-22, Jesus calls two sets of brothers to be his disciples. "He called them. Immediately they left the boat and their father, and followed Him." The word of God is a living document and I think that is why in my recent grief I am drawn to consider the dad, Zebedee, in this situation. Most of us have heard this bible story many times. (I encourage you to also read Luke 5 which offers more context around this moment.) I'll be honest and say I previously thought it was quite a sad moment when the brothers leave their father. It seems so abrupt. Since I just lost my dad and have the raw knowledge that no amount of time would have ever been enough; I would think the sad feeling this passage used to trigger would be stronger – but in fact it is quite the contrary.

I used to imagine James and John leaving their dad, then pictured a sorrowful Zebedee trying to mend his nets all alone. Now, I realize I had the emotion surrounding this moment all wrong. Of course, there is sadness as your children leave "the nest," but it is much more complex than that. You see, Jesus had been hanging out in Zebedee's hometown - preaching and performing miracles in Galilee. Their neighbors and townsmen had been showing up to listen and see the miracles. There was such a crowd to hear Jesus that day, that Jesus got on Peter's fishing boat to preach to the shore. I mention this to point out that I feel sure Zebedee had been hearing of the man, Jesus. I imagine that Zebedee was a faithful man and his whole family had been waiting on the Messiah who now, literally stood preaching before them and overflowing their decks with fish. Zebedee, the dad of James and John, was "astonished" at his works and when Jesus called Zebedee's sons to follow Him and to become "fishers of men," I doubt sadness or dejection was his primary emotion. Rather, I picture Zebedee humbled, and yet filled with fatherly pride that his sons had the faith he had prayed for and they would be used meaningfully in Jesus' ministry.

Parents spend their lives raising and teaching their children and hope they will carry on in faith as they become adults. I am glad that the grief I have from losing my dad helped me to focus on the father in this passage. Like Mary Kathleen Duncan recently taught us, I am glad I didn't miss it... I am thankful God didn't let me miss this chance to see Zebedee for the faithfully proud man he was in the moment his sons were called to be disciples.
