From the Pews, Amanda Brinkley

1 Corinthians 2: 1-5

In today's environment, we are constantly bombarded with worldly wisdom. We are exposed to "wise" people and ideals from every direction-news outlets, social media, podcasts, and our peers. The wisdom of the world often sounds very impressive and confident, and has attractive goals of the good life and beautiful people. We're continually enticed by the idea that if you keep working towards wisdom, you too can achieve these goals.

But even during Paul's time, there was the distraction of fulfilling life in Corinth with the beauty, art, and music of the age. His words today remind us that we should strive for heavenly wisdom as further described in James 3: "... wisdom that is from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, willing to yield, full of mercy and good fruits, without partiality and without hypocrisy."

God granted humans the ability to be able to gain wisdom, but where worldly wisdom goes astray is how to get there. It isn't the right book, the right classes, or even the right church that grants us wisdom. As Paul directs, it is a demonstration of the Holy Spirit that leads us there. In today's passage Paul comes in weakness, with fear and trembling, not with wise and persuasive words. He becomes nothing so that Christ may be everything. Warren Wiersebe, in his book Be Wise, says it best: "He wanted them to trust in God and not the messenger God sent. Had he depended on human wisdom and presented the plan of salvation as a philosophical system, then the Corinthians would have put their trust in an explanation. Because Paul declared the Word of God in the power of God, his converts put their faith in a demonstration: They experienced God at work in their own lives.'

Motivating Question: What role can religion play in racial justice? *Claire Gilliland* – Room 212

Join us for a 4 week discussion on how religious beliefs and organizations can contribute to racial justice. Across our sessions, we will explore the Biblical motivations for pursuing racial justice, the empirical reality of racial inequality in the U.S., and the ways religious groups both positively and negatively contribute to racial justice in both their words and their actions. Designed to be an interactive course with both lecture and discussions, we will approach these big questions with a sense of curiosity and care.

Claire Gilliland is a Sociology professor at Furman University, where she researches how religious organizations both fight against inequality and sometimes make it worse. She completed her PhD from UNC-Chapel Hill in May 2021, and her dissertation focused on how clergy talk about social issues from the pulpit. She grew up Presbyterian and joined Westminster in 2021 with her husband. At WPC, she serves as a youth group advisor, on the Creation Stewardship Committee, and on the Heritage Lecture Committee.

Jov in Chains:

A Chapter-by-Chapter Study of Paul's Letter to the Philippians *Leigh Stuckey* – Room 209

Press on toward the goal! Rejoice in the Lord always! Do not be anxious! Count all gains as loss! Accomplish all things through Christ! Paul's letter to the church in Philippi has been extracted for short bursts of biblical wisdom, but its richness lies in a developed understanding of its context, content, and core proclamation. Join us for this four week study of Philippians, one of Paul's most theologically rich letters written while he was a guest of the Roman magistrates and (literally) in chains. The letter is a thoroughgoing defense of Christian unity and is suffused with joy despite Paul's situation. It tells us not only who Christ is, but who we are called to be in light of that revelation. This course will attend to the letter chapter-by-chapter in brief lectures.

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
