After my sophomore year in college, I somehow convinced my parents that joining two of my friends for a cross-country road trip would be a good idea. My friends had spent the summer in Montana, and I planned to meet them out there and we would drive back to Clemson, South Carolina. I thought this was a phenomenal idea.... but my parents took some convincing. After several discussions about the trip, they reluctantly allowed me to go.

This was over twenty years ago, so iPhones and GPS systems weren't available. My mother was quite nervous about this adventure, so she called AAA to make sure I had an account and to get as much material as possible about driving across the United States. Several days later, a giant package arrived with multiple maps and a Rand McNally road atlas. I called my friends a few more times and we planned our route. We wanted to go south to see the Grand Canyon, Texas, and Louisiana before heading back to Clemson.

Other than a busted radiator hose outside of El Paso, Texas, the trip was a huge success and I'll never forget that experience. I was able to see the beauty of the United States and its extensive geography. This was the trip of a lifetime for me, but I can only imagine the stress it caused my parents. Having kids of my own now, I fully understand the concern that every parent has for their children. I'm sure my parents said numerous prayers, as I do now, and reviewed passages such as Psalm 121 for comfort.

As we celebrate Youth Sunday and hear from a number of our high school seniors, I'd encourage them to participate in as many adventures as possible. It's a great opportunity to learn something new and can help broaden your perspective on different matters. Adventures don't have to be trips, either. It could be participating in a new group or event, or volunteering for a worthy cause.

Most importantly, I want our youth to know they have the prayers of a full congregation supporting them as they move along through their journey. I hope they enjoy those experiences and feel comforted by the support that WPC provides. And finally, they should assuredly know the Lord will be with them every step of the way. As Psalm 121 verse 7 & 8 says, "The Lord will keep you from all harm - he will watch over your life; the Lord will watch over your coming and going both now and forevermore."

Religion & Racial Justice: What role can religion play in racial justice?

Claire Gilliland – Room 212

Join us for a 4 week discussion on how religious beliefs and organizations can contribute to racial justice. Across our sessions, we will explore the Biblical motivations for pursuing racial justice, the empirical reality of racial inequality in the U.S., and the ways religious groups both positively and negatively contribute to racial justice in both their words and their actions. Designed to be an interactive course with both lecture and discussions, we will approach these big questions with a sense of curiosity and care.

Claire Gilliland is a Sociology professor at Furman University, where she researches how religious organizations both fight against inequality and sometimes make it worse. She completed her PhD from UNC-Chapel Hill in May 2021, and her dissertation focused on how clergy talk about social issues from the pulpit. She grew up Presbyterian and joined Westminster in 2021 with her husband. At WPC, she serves as a youth group advisor, on the Creation Stewardship Committee, and on the Heritage Lecture Committee.

Joy in Chains:

A Chapter-by-Chapter Study of Paul's Letter to the Philippians

Paul's letter to the church in Philippi has been extracted for short bursts of biblical wisdom, but its richness lies in a developed understanding of its context, content, and core proclamation. Join us for this four week study of Philippians, one of Paul's most theologically rich letters written while he was a guest of the Roman magistrates and (literally) in chains. The letter is a thoroughgoing defense of Christian unity and is suffused with joy despite Paul's situation. It tells us not only who Christ is, but who we are called to be in light of that revelation. This course will attend to the letter chapter-by-chapter in brief lectures.
