From the Pews, Scott & Susan Clark

We have fifty-two cookbooks stacked, shelved and ordered in and around our kitchen. Some titles and writers that are probably familiar to you. There is Ina and Martha and Julia, of course. The Junior League from the various southern cities that we have lived in seems overrepresented in our collection. The best book in the group was not written by a TV star or a Sumter PTA group. The best one is comprised of recipes assembled from family favorites passed down from one generation to the next. The names in that book might not be as familiar to you as the others. There is Susie, Ruth, Nancy, Punk, Judy, Linda and Ann. Women that fed families over three generations. These recipes tell a lot about who those women are or were and where they came from.

No matter where you come from, if you are someone who cooks regularly, you can probably produce a reliable lasagna or meatloaf recipe. But you might not have a go to for crab imperial or a crab cake recipe with only four ingredients that produces the only crab cakes this family will eat. If you trace your roots to the Eastern Shore of Maryland, you probably do have both of those recipes in your arsenal.

Turns out, those four basic, handwritten ingredients in the crab cake recipe are well-known to just about everyone – crab, mayonnaise, Old Bay and crushed saltines. Good ingredients – the big things – are important for sure, but as it happens the little things matter too. How much of this, how long for that. It's those little things that ultimately make the big difference.

Beyond tradition and heritage, the recipes in this book are cherished for another reason — they are handwritten by the person who made them special. A person's handwriting is a deeply evocative thing. Just looking at the handwriting of a mother or a father, for instance, evokes powerful feelings of nostalgia — a birthday card, a cancelled check, a word of encouragement slipped into a school lunch bag or a grocery list casually written and discarded, but discovered unexpectedly years later in a utility drawer. Reading it is almost like hearing that person's voice. Handwriting is quietly one of the most intimate indicators about your relationship with a person. If you know someone's handwriting well, that person is probably an important person to you.

If you have been fortunate enough to have family and loved ones in your life, then it means those people had time and opportunity to make an impression on you. Time and opportunity to write their love on your heart. There are, however, many, many more people who will be in and out of your life with whom you won't have that time and opportunity. You may only get a short time and little opportunity – a mustard seed's worth.

Someone two streets over in the neighborhood who walks her dog on your street and who you know enough to ask her thoughts on the weather but little else. A grocery clerk who always has a smile but also a heart heavy with loss and unspoken grief. The person at the other end of your pew whose name you have seen countless times in the Ritual of Friendship but never uttered in a greeting.

What can you write for such people? What love or joy can you put in their lives in the short time and little opportunity you get with them? It could be that it is indeed only a little thing, some token of human kindness, a word to let them know that you see them and you see them trying. But it could be that the little thing is the thing that makes the big difference.
