Isaiah 40:21-31

Isaiah is one of the most loved books of the Old Testament. It is sometimes referred to as the 'fifth gospel'. The message to the Israelites in Chapter 40 is one of comfort, hope and God's glory. It is a reminder that God is sovereign over all nations and people. God knew the Israelites as he knows each of us. He recreates and strengthens us even when we are not aware of his presence. Like the Israelites, we can be prone to weariness and despair with the state of our world. We may wonder where God is. Waiting on the Lord is a major theme in the Bible.

Verse 31 states, "But those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles; they shall run and not be weary; they shall walk and not faint." It is so hard to wait for God! What does it mean? It means not giving up even though we are confused about the evil and suffering in the world. Waiting isn't a passive activity. It can be filled with positive expectation and anticipation. We can wait by seeking God in Bible study and prayer. We can wait by being obedient, helping those who need us. Finally, we can wait by realizing that God is at work within us and the world.

"Waiting and Longing"

God of the Seasons, God of the years, God of the eons, Alpha and Omega, before and after us.

You promise and we wait: we wait with eager longing, we wait amid doubt and anxiety, we wait with patience thin and then doubt and then we take life into our own hands.

HANDS-ONLY CPR CLASS

February is designated as Heart Month, focusing on heart health and cardiovascular disease prevention. What better way to celebrate this initiative than participating in a hands-only CPR class! According to the American Heart Association, about 90 percent of people who suffer out-of-hospital cardiac arrests die. CPR, especially if performed immediately, can double or triple a cardiac arrest victim's chance of survival.

On Wednesday, February 21, at 4p. a 45-minute class will be held at Westminster in Room 209 and is open to 15 participants (teenagers and adults only). The class will teach basic hands-only CPR (compressions), NOT certification for full CPR training. We also hope to have an AED demonstration and practice as well. ADULT EDUCATION ON SUNDAY MORNINGS

We at Westminster believe that education is essential for discipleship and hope that what you learn in this place will transform your living beyond our doors. This quarter will run each Sunday through February 25. You are welcome to join any class at any point!

1. The Last Days of Christ Led by Leigh Stuckey

Room 209

"The Christmas Feast is already a fading memory, / And already the mind begins to be vaguely aware / Of Lent and Good Friday which cannot, after all, now / Be very far off." (from For the Time Being, Auden). As we prepare to move into Lent, with the liturgical scent of pine a fading memory, we turn our eyes towards the final, climactic stories of Jesus' earthly life. Join us for this five week lecture-style series during which we will explore Peter's confession, the triumphal entry, John's account of the Last Supper, the Synoptic Last Supper, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday.

2. The Confessions by St. Augustine of Hippo Taught by John MacCarthy

Room 211

St. Augustine (354-430 CE) is viewed as one of the most important of the early "Church Fathers." He is often credited with providing the initial philosophical basis for Christian theology, and his writings have had a major impact on the development of Western philosophy, Western Christianity, and developmental psychology. He is also considered one of the theological fathers of the Protestant Reformation and is credited with our understanding of doctrines of grace, predestination, and original sin. St. Augustine's Confessions is generally considered one of his most important (and accessible) works. It is the story of his journey from "sinful youth" to his adult conversion to Christianity (thanks to his mother's constant "help") I personally find it to be one of the most hilariously funny works by a serious philosopher/theologian that I have had the pleasure to read (and I hope that by the end of the class, you will share this opinion as well). The course will begin with a brief overview of the life and significance of St. Augustine and some of the relevant heresies of the time and then proceed to an in-depth study of Confessions.

3. The Flock Reads the Psalms Led by Members of The Flock

Join the Flock (an age-and-stage group at Westminster with folks ranging from mid-40s through late 50s) for an in-depth study of a book of the Bible. Each week the group will read and explore a text from the Psalms. This discussion-style class is facilitated by members of the Flock.
