From the Pews, Mike Peters

Today is Super Bowl Sunday, that distinctly American spectacle of athletic prowess, showmanship and commercialism. Here at Westminster, it is also Youth Sunday when our youth speak about the Bible passages that have particular meaning to them. It is also the day the youth encourage us to collect canned goods and contributions for the Souper Bowl of Caring and to pack meals with Rise Against Hunger.

Each year the Super Bowl reminds us of the powerful role sports and especially football seem to play in our lives. But the cultural importance of sports is not unique to our time. The Greeks, in the time of Christ, celebrated sports and champion athletes as well. Even the apostle Paul used a sport's analogy in his ministry. Consider this passage from his first letter to the church in Corinth as presented in Eugene Peterson's interpretation, The Message.

"You've all been to the stadium and seen the athletes race. Everyone runs; one wins. Run to win. All good athletes train hard. They do it for a gold medal that tarnishes and fades. You're after one that's gold eternally."

Paul's admonition reflects the words from Christ's Sermon on the Mount found in Matthew 6:30, a passage that our Youth Group studied just last week. "But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness ..."

The world offers constant distractions and enticements that divert us from what is truly important. We are encouraged to get ahead, to win, but to win in arenas where the prizes are ephemeral and will not last. Amidst the noise and confusion of everyday life it is difficult to remain focused on the prize that does not fade – our relationship with Jesus Christ. As the youth remind us in the passage from Matthew, let us continue to seek first His kingdom. It's hard. You have to train for it. Like even the best athletes we will stumble at times. But the prize is worth it – the gold that does not tarnish or fade, the kingdom of God. Let's run for the gold that does not fade.
