NURSERY

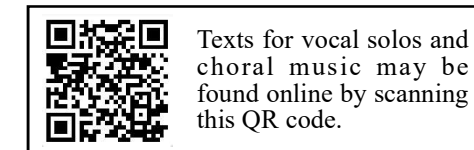

From the Pews, Mary Frances Knapp

Have you ever missed the forest for the trees?

We often become so consumed in our day-to-day lives that we fail to see the bigger picture. The world around us can be non-sensical at times. Things don't go according to plan, and life does not turn out the way we think it should. Grief, stress, and even joy can be overwhelming if we lose sight of God's larger plan in place.

In Mark's New Testament lesson, Jesus asks Peter and the disciples, "Who do people think I am?" They respond with a handful of different answers-John the Baptist, Elijah, one of the prophets. Then Jesus asks them, "But who do YOU say that I am?" Peter answers, "You are the Messiah." At this, Jesus reprimands Peter, and he warns the disciples not to tell anyone about him. Jesus goes on to tell the disciples what will happen to him. He will suffer greatly, be rejected, crucified, and yet three days later will rise from the dead.

I have to imagine that the disciples' heads were spinning! Here is this man who has been performing miracles and yet no one is supposed to talk about it? Furthermore, he foretells of his suffering and death at the hands of his own people, and then he's going to rise from the dead? How can this be possible?

At the time, the disciples could not see the bigger picture. Jesus was teaching them of God's plan for us-that he sent Jesus to save us all from our sins. They could not comprehend what he was telling them at the time, but Jesus encourages them to be steadfast in their faith. As we often do in our own lives, the disciples only saw the trees and not the forest. We, too, should stay strong in our faith that God's plan is always bigger than our own-even if we are unable to understand it at the time. And in that good news, we can rejoice!
