The World Turned Upside Down: Exploring the Gospel of Luke

In some ways, Luke is the most wellknown and beloved of the four Gospels. Only in Luke do we hear about shepherds at Christmas, the parables of the good Samaritan and the prodigal son, and the Easter story of the road to Emmaus. Luke is a Gospel with prominent themes of table fellowship, forgiveness, and joy. At the same time, some of the most challenging words and parables of Jesus are found in Luke-teachings that deal with repentance, money, and lost opportunities to live for God.
