SPRING SERMON SERIES

THE SERMON ON THE MOUNT: BUT I SAY TO YOU

This spring, we will explore the Sermon on the Mount, found in chapters 5-7 of Matthew. These three chapters contain some of Jesus' best-known teachings, such as the Beatitudes, and some of his most difficult teachings, such as his instruction about anger and loving one's enemies. To help you follow along, our scripture passages for the next three weeks are the following:

Mar 1: Matthew 6:7-13, 25-34

Mar 8: Matthew 7:1-5

Mar 15: Matthew 7:13-14

ELEMENTS OF COMMUNION

Our goal is to provide elements for communion that all are able to consume. It is an act of hospitality mirrored in God's hospitality inviting us to the table. The bread we are offering at today's communion is labeled by the manufacturer as gluten, nut, egg, and dairy free, and includes the following ingredients: water, sour dough (rice flour, water), rice starch, comstarch, sugars (rice syrup, caramelized sugar), modified cellulose, psyllium seed husk (vegetable fibre), sunflower oil, pea protein, yeast, millet flour, citrus fibre, rice flour, quinoa flour, salt, guar gum, corn flour. May Contain: Mustard, Sesame.

From the Pews, Tim Reed

Today's scripture offers an opportunity to ponder. I haven't murdered anybody, Check. But have I ever been angry with my brother or sister? Double-Check.

In this passage, Jesus takes a familiar command-do not murder-and quietly moves it closer to home. He shifts the focus from the outward act to the inner posture that gives it life. Anger, contempt, dismissive words, these may seem minor compared to physical violence, yet Jesus treats them seriously. Not because they always explode into something worse, but because they shape how we see one another.

What is most striking about this teaching is its emphasis on relationships. Acts of worship, offerings, and religious practices are not disregarded, but they are paused when there is unresolved conflict between people. Jesus highlights that mending broken relationships is just as important as participating in religious rituals. Reconciliation is not presented as a mere moral obligation; rather, it is seen as an essential act that creates room for honesty, humility, and peace in our lives.

The need to settle festering, unresolved matters tends to grow heavier over time. What begins as irritation can harden into distance, and distance into judgment. Jesus does not outline every situation or offer simple formulas, but he does invite attentiveness—to words, emotions, and timing.

Perhaps the invitation here is not perfection, but awareness: noticing when anger lingers, when relationships strain, and when a small step toward reconciliation might matter more than we think.

Think twice before you say "I'm so mad at you, I could kill you."

Ultimately, this passage invites us to be attentive to our emotions and relationships. By choosing reconciliation over resentment, we create space for honesty, humility, and peace in our lives.
