


From the Pews, Skip Gordon

Today's scripture is about hypocritical judgment. Judgment by itself is OK but we are told to use the same measure of judgment on ourselves as we do with others. In other words, self-examination first. But how do we do this? Other Biblical passages as found in Luke and Romans address the same judgment issue. None of these passages give advice on how to avoid hypocritical judgment – only that you should not do it.

Every morning, I see myself in the mirror. Other than being a bit older than I like, everything looks OK with some flaws. Then if I look in a 10x mirror, all my flaws are exposed – many more than I thought I had. While Jesus gives us a couple of examples of hypocritical judgment in his message, He does not give us a tool like a 10x mirror to help us find our way. I like explicit directions in solving problems whether it is a plumbing issue or a golf swing problem. Having straight forward instructions helps immensely.

So, can I find a "10x mirror" solution to this problem? If I could, I would write a book about it, and it might make Oprah's Best Book List. Prayer, scripture and meditation would help. However, everyday events often overwhelm the help that these might offer.

So, I need something simpler for everyday interactions. I remember my parents reminding me to think before I open my mouth to speak. Although I often overlook this guide, it frequently helps me avoid problems. Maybe, if I expand this guide a bit, I can be less hypocritical in my judgment comments.

Following Jesus' teachings on how we should live is very difficult. Certainly, prayer and scripture help build a foundation for living a Christ-like life. Yet as imperfect humans we still fail. Perhaps by each of us finding a personal "10x mirror" key, we can improve on how we follow Christ.



The Campaign Feasibility Committee: Frequently Asked Questions

As Westminster explores the possibility of a capital campaign, many insightful questions have emerged from members. This FAQ gathers those questions and provides clear, concise answers to help the congregation understand the purpose, priorities, and impact of the proposed projects.

Q: If approved, what would a capital campaign fund?

A: We are exploring the following major priorities:

- Expansion of the Westminster Weekday School (“WWS”)
- Office relocation and improvements
- Facility refreshes in key gathering and hospitality areas
- Construction of a chapel for smaller worship services and spiritual formation
- A 10% tithe to a designated Witness & Service partner (or partners)

Q: When was our last capital campaign?

A: “A Place for Everyone” was conducted in 2007, 19 years ago, and raised \$5.6M to support the expansion of our Sanctuary.

Q: Has the Session approved a capital campaign?

A: No. The Session has approved the formation of a Campaign Feasibility Committee and the completion of a feasibility study to determine *if* a campaign is feasible and, if so, which of the above priorities would be included. We are working with Armstrong McGuire to conduct conversations and solicit surveys to determine the interest of the congregation in a campaign and the specific projects proposed. Armstrong McGuire will present a report to the Campaign Feasibility Committee that will include a recommended capital campaign goal and a summary of the priorities that the congregation believes are most important. In May 2026, the committee will make a recommendation to the Session based on the report from Armstrong McGuire.

Q: What if we cannot raise the full amount – currently estimated at \$13M?

A: This amount reflects the combined cost of the suggested projects and *is not yet a campaign goal*. The feasibility study will help our partners at Armstrong McGuire determine our capacity as a congregation to engage in a capital campaign. Should a campaign be considered feasible, they will work with us to recommend a viable goal and a campaign that aligns with the priorities of the congregation. The final goal and scope of the campaign will be officially set by the Session and may not include every item on the proposed project list.

Q: How will the 10% mission tithe be used?

A: Westminster has a tradition of tithing 10% of overall campaign costs to support transformational Witness & Service projects, and we intend to do so if the way is clear for a capital campaign in 2026. The tithe will support outreach efforts beyond WPC’s existing annual commitments. The Witness & Service Committee will make a recommendation to the Session regarding the investment of the 10% tithe. Ultimately, the Session will approve both the tithe partner(s) and project(s).

Q: Will WPC take on debt to complete the project?

A: Westminster does not currently hold debt. Whether Westminster takes on debt in a campaign like this depends on final costs associated with a campaign and the amount pledged from the congregation. It is not the desire of Westminster’s Session to take on significant debt.

Q: Is WPC financially stable enough to take on a capital campaign?

A: Yes. WPC maintains a strong financial position, healthy reserves, and a history of successful stewardship in past campaigns. The current endowment is \$1.45M. At present, funds from the endowment are not used for facilities or for maintenance of our campus.

Q: How do the proposed projects respond to WPC’s changing demographics?


A: The church has experienced significant growth across all age demographics, particularly among young families. The proposed facilities address this shift by expanding program capacity and improving ministry spaces.

Q: If approved, how long will the campaign last?

A: The campaign will include a preparation phase, a leadership gifts phase, a congregational phase, and a concluding celebration. We won’t know the duration of the campaign until the feasibility stage is complete and the Session has determined the scope for the proposed campaign. During the feasibility stage we are asking families about their preference between a three- and five-year campaign pledge period.

Q: Will the annual stewardship campaign continue during the capital campaign?

A: Yes. Pledges and annual giving support our ongoing ministry and operations and will remain essential during a campaign. Gifts to the capital campaign are above and beyond annual pledging.

A: The chapel will be used for intimate services, including small weddings and funerals. It will also be used by other ministries in the church, such as WPCYG, WPC Kids, WWS and other groups.

Q: Is WWS a separate 501(c)3 or a part of Westminster?

A: The Weekday School is a vital ministry of the church. It is not a separate 501(c)3.

Facilities, Parking, and Space Utilization

Q: Will this project impact parking?

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Q: Could reconfiguring current spaces meet the church’s needs without building new space?

A: During due diligence, a facility use assessment revealed that most areas within the church are regularly occupied by various ministries and community events. Present evaluations indicate that significant ministries – such as WWS, WPCYG, It’s Elementary, and daily staff operations – either lack adequate space or operate in outdated facilities. Simply reconfiguring existing spaces will not address the church’s long-term growth projections.

Visuals, Renderings, and Project Details

Q: When will architectural drawings be available?

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Q: How will the offices be reconfigured?

A: Offices would be consolidated and moved to create a collaborative workflow near the current W. Augusta Place entrance (presently the “main office”). The Children’s Church room and Family Lounge would be relocated to a space adjacent to the Atrium, creating both accessibility and proximity to the Sanctuary.

Q: What specific spaces will be refreshed or renovated?

A: Updates are planned for the Youth Suite, the Friendship Court, restrooms, offices, and gathering spaces. These spaces were frequently described as outdated or not reflective of WPC’s warmth or hospitality.
